Out of Office Fridays Dear Friends,

For us in the Church, January marks the bright beautiful season of Epiphany. This is when we look for and try to understand appearances of God in our lives. Be it watching these manifestations in other people's lives, hearing their stories about it, or seeing it unfold in our own daily experiences – Epiphany is a time to listen, look around, and become aware both externally and internally of Christ's presence.

One way, I find, is to look to nature and to naturalists, who record the design and changes in our world. So far, I notice, we have had at least one heavy snowstorm in the Farmington Valley. The native grasses, blue green evergreens and oak limbs were weighed down by the wet snow, which glistened when the sun returned the following day. (My excitement surrounding the first snow of the season seemed no different than when I first experienced it years ago.)

I am reminded of the story of Wilson Bentley, better known as "Snowflake" Bentley. He was the naturalist, who took the first photograph of a snowflake in 1885 in Jericho, Vermont, and later identified the differences among them. Raised by farming parents and unschooled in his rural setting, Bentley grew up learning to read his mother's set of encyclopedias. As a result he became an astute observer of nature, particularly clouds, fog, rainfall, and snow. He yearned to learn more about God's world.

At age fifteen Bentley began studying snowflakes under a microscope. He would try to make drawings of what he saw, working as rapidly as he could before they melted. He continued this scientific method for three years, collecting hundreds of drawings of snow crystals. Eventually his parents took most of their hard-earned savings to buy him a newly invented camera with a microscope attached. Bentley caught snowflakes on black velvet, placed them on glass plates, took photos of them -- and soon came to realize that no two snowflakes were alike!

His photographs were collected in his book called <u>Snow Crystals</u>, and articles about his findings were published in well-known reputable scientific journals. After his death in 1931 most of his collection was given to the Buffalo Museum of Science as well as to friends. These photographs showed the meticulousness of his work, the complexity and beauty of nature, and the irrefutable proof that, despite the seeming sameness of snow, no two snowflakes are exactly alike.

The natural beauty of our world, even down to the smallest and seemingly most insignificant snow-flakes, which Bentley called "tiny miracles of beauty," bespeaks the magnificence and grandeur of God's creation. And Snowflake Bentley's life work showing us a part of this world at the microscopic level is a manifestation of God-with-us.

Message from the Treasurer

Our Stewardship campaign has been underway for over a month and continues. We encourage all who can to pledge this year. You will note a "Stewardship Thermometer" in church to show where we stand compared to our past levels and our ability to continue to provide our many programs and ministries for 2015. Please call the office with your commitment or mail in your pledge card.

The \$ pledge total is vital to our Board of Finance calculating our total income for our 2015 budget. Our expenses have been well controlled over the years but some costs are outside of our control and increasing. Last year, due to reduced income and fixed costs, we were forced to fund more money for operations from the endowment funds and transfer more money than is normal or sustainable from the special 2013 budget.

The Board of Finance is putting together our budget now with expectations of pledge income of around \$740,000 or so which will allow us to provide our many valuable existing programs, ministries, and outreach to our community. This is a sustainable level but more than last year. With your help, we will reach this level with assurance that this year will be a prosperous one for us all.


