- Can I tell that I'm special to you by the way that you look at me?



## *A Message from Anastasia*

Recently, I've been in a place of stress and worry, afraid that if I wasn't constantly keeping up with all my work I wasn't accomplishing anything, and that I was losing precious time. All of my worrying just drove me into more worry and anxiety and separated me further from the inner voice of peace. I felt a godly reminder to slow down and to seek rest. This situation in my life reminded me of the story of Mary and Martha.

This story is in Luke chapter 10: 38-41, and it tells of Jesus traveling and being welcomed to Martha's house. While Jesus was there, Martha was fretting about all that needed to be done, and Mary, her sister, was seated at Jesus's feet, listening to His word. Martha seems to be annoyed and anxious that she's working so hard while Mary is enjoying listening to Jesus and being in His presence. Martha grows fed up and complains to Jesus that Mary isn't helping her. I imagine that Martha expected Jesus to agree with her, but He tells her that she worries too much, and that Mary has chosen what is best, listening to what he was saying.

I remember this story was told to me with the purpose of instilling a lesson that choosing to listen to God was the most important and valuable thing, far more worthy than anything else that required work, like preparing a meal. I found solace revisiting this scripture and thinking back on that teaching from long ago. I can relate with Martha in that preparing for what's to come often gets me distracted from what's here. In fact, I think we can all relate to Martha. She was concerned with practical matters, she had good intentions, and she was being responsible. But she became worried and bothered by so many things. Her work and worry interfered with her ability to choose the pleasure Mary had, that I think she also desired.

Jesus offers a gracious answer to Martha, and to me too. Only one thing is really important, and that's listening to the voice of wisdom, listening to God speak, and being present in the moment. Amazing God! In my season of busyness, God reminds me that although my work and intentions are admirable, the most important priority is my relationship with God.

Being a busybody is a way of life for many of us, especially at the beginning of a new year. We make new goals, aspire to accomplish more and we fill up our schedules with more and more things to do. But the story of Mary and Martha teaches all of us a lesson to not be caught up in daily toil. Otherwise we miss the opportunity to spend time in relationship with God. In this new year, let's take time to slow down from our doing and worrying. Let's focus inward and tend to the conversation between us and God.



## Being Green

### An occasional column on the work of the Environmental Ministries Team

*“When one tugs at a single thing in nature, he finds it attached to the rest of the world.” John Muir*

Kermit the Frog claimed, “It isn’t easy being green!” He, of course, was talking about being different in a homogeneous society, and on that score, he was right. Since that time, being green has come to mean something different, signaling an environmental consciousness and conscience and behaving accordingly. And today, in this context, it isn’t so hard to be green.

Under the banner of Environmental Justice, the Connecticut Conference of the United Church of Christ has formed an Environmental Ministries Team “to engage churches of the Conference in an active program of caring for God’s creation via environmental stewardship that will preserve and restore Creation for our descendants and for all living things on Earth.” Made up of lay leaders in local churches across Connecticut, the Environmental Ministries Team works with congregations to:

- Reduce the environmental impact of their church facilities and activities,
  - Assist their members to reduce the environmental impact of their homes, activities, and businesses, and
- Reach out to others to work and advocate for environmental stewardship.

Our denomination has declared that we are called by God to be stewards of Creation. We are witness to the destruction of our Earth and its communities, on local, regional and global scales. We are witness to the unjust burden of that destruction, which is borne by our most vulnerable and marginalized communities. And we are called to act to create a society that embraces our interdependence with all of Creation, and accepts moral responsibility for the impact of humanity’s choices.

Now if being green means working to change society, how can that not be hard? It sounds like an enormous challenge. But in a variation on “Many hands make light work,” many green hands make the lights work, the gardens grow, the landfills shrink; they can even stabilize climate change, halt the destruction of our ecosystems, and provide purpose and hope to impoverished people around the world. It is the collective impact of individual actions that creates this power, and those individual actions are not hard.

The Connecticut Conference, together with the Inter-Religious Eco-Justice Network, has developed a list of action steps for local churches. Fulfillment of these steps leads to recognition as a Green Congregation. To date, forty-nine congregations in the state have qualified for one of three levels of achievement. First Church Simsbury has already completed many of these challenges, including performing an environmental audit, showing environmental films, recycling paper, bottles and cans, installing LED lighting, assisting with Simsbury’s Community Farm, and making conservation resources available to church members.

In 2017, First Church gathered an Environmental Ministries Team to publicize and pursue a program of conscientious environmental stewardship. Over the coming months, we will provide educational opportunities, hands-on projects, and lots of encouragement to join in the work to change society through collective effort. And make it easier to be green.

## Poking Around the Archives . . .

*...from Ken Poppe on behalf of the Heritage Committee*



- With the Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday coming on January 21, it is important to recall the role that First Church played in his early life. King and other students from Morehouse College in Atlanta spent several summers in the 1940s working in the tobacco fields of Connecticut and attended church services in Hartford and at the Methodist and First Church in Simsbury. According to Bernice Martin, long-term member of our church who died a few years ago at the age of 106, King sang in our choir that was directed by her husband. In letters to his mother in Georgia, King mentioned how he was so pleased to be in a non-segregated state.
- Rev. Hugh MacCallum was the First Church senior pastor from 1910 to 1919. He must have been invited back to preach at the 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the church's birthday in 1947. In the archives there is a hand-written copy of his sermon, which includes some interesting commentary:
  - ✓ Referring to Isaiah 51, he suggests that First Church members need to be reminded that the people of the past, particularly early Puritans, were the rock upon which Protestant Christianity was based. The Puritans, he said, based their beliefs on John Calvin. Calvin went further than the Lutherans who 'left many of the ideas and practices of Rome untouched' and were more clearly based on Biblical sources than the Catholics.
  - ✓ "Calvin thought that man was born in sin, utterly helpless, vile, depraved—we do not think that way today but nevertheless in view of the devilish things which have happened the past few years [WWII ?] we will have to admit that the Calvinist was much nearer to the truth of things than the humanist of our day."
  - ✓ "We are not the spiritual descendants of moral or physical weaklings, but of strong, valiant men who thought deeply, lived strenuously and labored unceasingly to build their homes, churches, schools and to transform a wilderness into the fair and pleasant land in which we live today."
  - ✓ "These men became exiles from their native land of England, they braved danger of the deep sea and the tomahawks of savage men to build new homes and churches in an unknown wilderness."
  - ✓ "True, the Puritans were narrow and intolerant as measured by our standards, but they lived in an intolerant age and we must never forget that it was the narrowness and intolerance of others which drove them out of England...they were prisoners of their age."
